OPENING OF PUBLIC MEETING/WORK SESSION

Call to Order:

Board Chair Howell called the meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. and verified that Mr. McGee was able to participate in the meeting.

➤ 2024-2025 Administrative Services Discipline Data Review

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Dr. Rodney Brown, Chief of Administrative Services, highlighted and explained discipline data that covered seven (7) years of data that included referral history increases and decreases, and a comparison graph which gave a breakdown of incidents in the division by month. He also discussed student discipline by school and location stating that 47 students accounted for three or more referrals which drives the high number of referrals being written. Dr. Brown also discussed school initiatives such as behavior remediation lessons, re-entry meetings, revised "division-wide" Student Code of Conduct Handbook, optimized weapons detector placement, restructured PBIS Teams, comprehensive anti-bullying campaigns, classroom guidance lessons, Handle With Care training, wraparound student supports, and adding innovation teams at schools needing additional resources, all aimed at reducing referrals.

Board Members, Dr. Gordon, Dr. Brown and staff discussed new initiatives and updated data being shared with the board each semester. They also discussed the Department of Criminal Justice survey, PBIS team restructuring/information, repositioning of metal detectors,

students vaping in bathrooms, measures for repeat offenders/nolle processed referrals, and parent/staff communication regarding processed referrals. Board members requested to receive a breakdown of incidents by borough for the 2024-2025 vs. 2025-2026 school years.

> Student Identification Badges

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Dr. Rodney Brown provided an overview of the student identification badge program. He explained that the badges would enhance security, monitor ridership on buses, and provide student recognition to bus drivers. Dr. Brown also explained the roll-out plan, locations, and future possibilities/multiple usage for student identification badges including media center, cafeteria, nurse/clinic, attendance, student count, athletic events. He also explained that once all equipment has been received and installed on the buses, the program will be piloted at on one elementary and middle school. After an assessment of the program, implementation will begin at the high school level.

Board Members, Dr. Gordon and Dr. Brown discussed ensuring correct usage and pictures on badges via community partnerships, additional program implementation in December 2025, assessing information from implementation of the pilot program, and the benefits/safeguards regarding this program for bus drivers and parents.

> SPS Instructional Overview

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Dr. Branch, Chief Academic Officer, Dr. Katelyn Leitner, Director of Curriculum and Instruction, and Dr. Casaundra McNair, Director of Special Education, gave an overview of Suffolk Public Schools' instructional services. Dr. Branch began by providing information regarding the 2025 Summer Series held at Hillpoint Elementary, King's Fork Middle, and Lakeland High Schools. Literacy and mathematics were integrated across all core content and supporting areas, remediation and/or SOL Academy, ESY, and Summer Bridge programs offered students a variety of intensive instructional support over a three weeks period. Additional summer programming included STEM Extravaganza which serviced 89 students, Gifted & Talented Summer Academy Student Showcase serviced 63 QUEST students, and the Music Recording and Production Camps which serviced 100 students. Dr. Branch also highlighted the phenomenal support received from the summer series partners.

Dr. Leitner provided instructional highlights including elevated focus areas for instructional consistency, enhanced interdisciplinary integration and real-word connections, targeted professional learning, and strengthened early learning and literacy foundations. She also provided updates regarding English, the Virginia Literacy Act, professional development, and the new History/Social Studies Standards of Learning. Dr. Leitner explained the progress taking place at the STEM Academy at BTWES. She highlighted the following: (1) staff hiring, (2) professional development, (3) community partnership and transportation meetings, and (4) Parent Kick-Off Night (over 260 in attendance). The STEM Academy at BTWES is the first STEM elementary school in the state of Virginia which will use the 5E Instructional Model (Engage, Explore, Explain, Elaborate, Evaluate) across all content areas. She also talked about instructional resources, curriculum guides, and instructional programming and supports.

Dr. McNair discussed High Leverage Practices, including collaboration, data-driven instructional planning, instruction in behavior and academics, and opportunities to intensify and intervene as necessary. She also explained that over 1200 building visits were completed with over 99% compliance. Dr. McNair highlighted a letter received from the Virginia Department of Education indicating that the Special Education Department is no longer under

watch for compliance. All information, instruction, and compliance will be shared with all educators to ensure all are informed and operating with consistency.

Dr. Branch concluded the presentation by providing information on goal setting, the Comprehensive School Performance Plan, content data review, checkpoints, quarterly/mid-year reviews, and responding to data, feedback and supporting the needs of the division.

Board Members, Dr. Gordon, Dr. Branch and her team discussed the impact of the STEM Academy on transportation, possible shuttle services, information dissemination via flyers to parents of students with disabilities, and parent drop-off/pick-up.

Request for Proposal of Audit

Vice Chair McGee moved and Board Member Dr. Brittingham seconded the motion to direct the Superintendent to instruct the Purchasing Department to issue a formal Request for Proposal (RFP) for a forensic review and internal control review, encompassing the following four areas: 1. Purchase Card (P-Cards) review procedures, 2. Accounts payable review procedures, 3. Cash and bank account review procedures, 4. A comprehensive evaluation of the internal control environment related to financial operations, with specific emphasis on P-Card usage, accounts payable, cash and bank accounts, and any additional areas as outlined in the attached supporting document labeled Forensic Accounting Investigation and Internal Control Review.

Dialogue ensued between board members and Attorney Waller as they discussed the difference/process between a Request for Information (RFI) and a Request for Proposal (RFP). Additional conversation was had regarding clarification of the goal for the RFP, the scope of work to include all board members not just a few, funding for audit, individual members' authority, Treasurer's Office/private schools involvement in audit, FOIA violations. Board Chair Howell and Attorney Waller addressed/provided clarification regarding the allegation of a FOIA violation. Dr. Gordon and Mrs. Forsman clarified that vendors who provide goods and services have the ability to provide costs for services, however for professional services, information within the law indicates that it must be decided first which professionals you want to use before negotiating a price. However, a general cost can be included in an RFI, if requested. They also discussed possible timelines for an RFP/RFI and the specificity of information needed for the scope of work for both in order to obtain a price. Additional conversation ensued regarding review cycles, frequency of using RFIs, obligation to vendors proving information for an RFP, input from all board members/citizens, specificity of financial information in an RFI vs. RFP, and the recommendation to do the RFI first then the RFP. After discussion, Vice Chair McGee amended his original motion to be in compliance with the date timeframe mentioned by Mrs. Forsman.

Vice Chair McGee moved and Board Member Dr. Brittingham seconded the motion to direct the Superintendent to instruct the Purchasing Department to issue a formal Request for Proposal (RFP) for a forensic review and internal control review, encompassing the following four areas: 1. Purchase Card (P-Cards) review procedures, 2. Accounts payable review procedures, 3. Cash and bank account review procedures, 4. Dr. Gordon, Division Superintendent, highlighted information from the calendar of special events. He stated that 155 new teachers were welcomed to SPS on Monday at New Teacher Orientation and he thanked Mayor Duman, Councilmen Rector and Bennett for participating/supporting that event. Dr. Gordon also expressed excitement for the upcoming ribbon cutting ceremony for the STEM Academy at BTWES.

Board Chair Howell reminded Board Members that personal devices are not allowed in closed meeting, but SPS issued laptops are permitted in the closed meeting area.

Meeting Called to Order:

Board Chair Howell reconvened the public meeting.

CERTIFICATION OF CLOSED MEETING

Attorney Wendell Waller read the following certification:

ACTION ON CLOSED MEETING ITEMS

Employee Appeal Number 2025/26-1

Board Member Dr. Brittingham moved and Board Member Slingluff seconded the motion to uphold the Superintendent's recommendation for dismissal (Resolution 25/26-6).

Board Chair Howell reminded Vice Chair McGee and Board Member Jenkins that their vote would be recorded because the information was available for their review a week in advance of the meeting.

Upon roll call vote, the vote was: Aye: 5 / Nay: 2 (Jenkins, Riddick) / Abstain: 0 / Absent: 0. The motion Passed by vote of 5 to 2.

BUSINESS BY BOARD MEMBERS

Comments and Reports by School Board Members:

Board Chair Howell reminded Board Members that each board member will have five minutes for their board member comments. This being the same amount of time for public speakers who appear before the school board.

Board Members thanked Dr. Gordon and his staff for their presentations and information, enjoyed summer school graduation, the Gifted and Talented Academy summer program, new teacher orientation, and looked forward to a great school year. They appreciated videos posted on social media of the work being done at JFKMS, the Citizens Advisory Committee Training session, and the 6th grade transition program at CFCMS. They also looked forward to the bus tours and encouraged students to enjoy what was left of the summer and to be ready for a great start of the year. Board members expressed their concern with disparaging/offensive remarks made by board members that are overlooked, baseless new policies and procedures, cliquish behavior by board members, and behaviors being displayed that are not indicative of the work accomplished at the school board retreat. Reminded all that our children are watching, and that employees are leaving SPS due to Board behaviors/policies being passed.

Heckling erupted in the audience and Board Chair Howell reminded all that the business meeting was still in progress. Board Chair Howell sought to recess the meeting in order to regain order and decorum, and then afterwards she adjourned the meeting.

Board Member Riddick:

Can I get my seconds back cuz I didn't speak yet? The citizens time don't start until they speak. Um, I find it quite interesting to see how the times have changed. I want to quote something that was shared with me um by a chair, and inspires me, "We are not here to try to lose people, we are here to attract people to our city. We're not here to try to lose people, we're here to attract people to our city." Tonight, I had the pro, the privilege to hear one of our citizens, I believe from the Holy Neck borough or the Chuckatuck borough, who um referenced about us setting aside our differences and working together. I want to tell you your actions have consequences and impact. This is not political, this is fact. There are people who are walking away from our school division as employees, because how board members have made them feel. Over the weeks, the month of July, I had the privilege to hear from former employees

and unsolicited, they told me why they left. When you are being demeaned for your work, and now people are saying offensive language on the dais and it's being overlooked, um and then when you correct the person, we get new procedures um that just, more, come out of nowhere. I find it baffling. I'mma be very clear, none of you put me here; none of you gonna remove me. I'm here to represent the historic Suffolk borough. My constituencies look different from yours. I'm going to represent my people. You don't have to like it. You didn't put me here. And because I work with people on both sides of the aisle, those who didn't put me here, I'm still their representative as well.

Um, I had a fruitful conversation with the consultant that we hired from California about us coming to the middle, and the question was, is, where did we go wrong? We talked so much great information at that retreat and then we came, and it was just like it was all undone; and I'm dealing with a group of people who throw a rock and hide their hands and holler Jesus. It is what it is. I didn't come to play. I came to do a job, and the job is to move Suffolk forward in the right direction, not in the direction that fits people fancies. I'm baffled how policies and new ordinances and procedures are just coming out of the woodworks, not going to policy review committee. And just because a policy is not in place, don't give the latitude as chair to just create something despite what advice and from whom you may have received it. I'm baffled how, what's good for one board member to say, it's dismissive when someone else said it. Or how other board members are talking to, while other board members are allowed to continue with their banter.

I had the privilege to go to several good events such as the citizens academy. When we were talking to the citizens and one of the major gripes that, not even a gripe, one of the major concerns that citizens had, those who volunteered to come and support, not just come to the dais and complain. What they said was how are we able to do our job with the policy that this board pushed through? Are we violating any federal rights? Are we, are we putting the board at this? They were af. There was great concern about that. I'm sorry I don't have a good fairy tale story to tell you as some of you may want to hear, but this is relative to board business and business by this board member, and I'm gonna speak my business because there's nothing in policy that says I can't. If we're going to build the best Suffolk Public Schools, this little click of three, and sometimes thee, has to stop because at the end of the day, these kids are watching. And I know my time is almost up.

Board Member Riddick:

Board Chair Howell:

I'm sorry, can you pause his time. Set it back to 10. Ladies and gentlemen of the...

Board Member Riddick:

...yeah.

Board Chair Howell:

...the audience, the community.

Board Member Riddick:

Cause she can leave.

Board Chair Howell:

I'm going to respectfully ask you to conduct yourselves with maturity and professionalism as well because we are still in the middle of business.

Board Member Riddick:

Mm-hmm.

Board Chair Howell:

So, if you have additional commentary, use your email or step outside.

Board Member Riddick:

Thank you, before I was rudely interrupted. Um, moving forward, I represent my citizens, and if you have an opinion, you go to your representative, because I'm going to represent mine and I don't care how you feel about it because at the end of the day, (the five minutes timer expired at this time and began chirping), the 14,500 students that I have been sworn to represent, I'm going to do it...

Board Chair Howell:

Thank you, Mr. Riddick.

Board Member Riddick:

...and if you don't like it, I said what I said and I stand 10 toes down on it. And I was gonna comply, but since you asked for the smoke, I'm going to give you the smoke.

Board Chair Howell:

Mr. Riddick, no. We're gonna...

Board Member Riddick:

Because the foolishness...

Board Chair Howell:

...move on maturely. Attorney Waller, could you help me with this?

Board Member Riddick:

...the foolishness that stop, we're not gonna deal with it. This click that is trying...

Board Chair Howell:

Mr. Littlefield, can you please put us in recess? Video feed was disconnected at this time.

Board Member Riddick:

...this click that is trying to run the school board is not gonna work. It's not going to work.

Board Chair Howell:

Mr. Riddick, I'm asking you nicely one more time to step back into your role as an adult and a professional...

Board Member Riddick:

Inaudible.

Board Chair Howell:

...and abide by...

Board Member Riddick:

You violated the Norms and Protocol by insinuating that I'm not an adult because I'm exercising my First Amendment Rights. How can you try to correct me and insult me at the same time?

Board Chair Howell:

I didn't say you're...

Board Member Riddick:

Inaudible.

Board Chair Howell:

...not an adult.

Board Member Riddick:

Inaudible...I'm asking you to step back in your role as an adult, that means I'm out of my role as an adult and what role am I in then at that point. Please speak to that specifically.

Board Chair Howell:

I don't think that's appropriate at this point, but you can ah, can discuss...

Board Member Riddick:

Why, because your response is not appropriate. Is that what you're saying?

Board Chair Howell:

Okay Mr. Riddick, your time is up. Board Member Slingluff.

Board Member Riddick:

No, nope, you-you corrected me, I'm asking you a question.

Board Chair Howell:

I'm not responding...

Board Member Riddick:

Exactly.

Board Chair Howell:

...I'm not required to.

Board Member Riddick:

You didn't respond when we were called ignorant.

Board Chair Howell:

Mr. Riddick, you are out of order.

Board Member Riddick:

Okay. What you gonna do?

Board Chair Howell:

Uh, Attorney Waller, what am I able to do when he's disregarding board um protocol and the chair's attempt to facilitate a productive meeting?

Attorney Waller: The most you can do is call him out of order.	
Board Chair Howell: Okay, so we just stay in recess till he calms down?	
Board Member Riddick: I'm not upset.	
Attorney Waller: I guess you could stay	
Board Member Riddick: You just called me a child.	
Attorney Waller:in recess.	
Board Member Riddick: And then I correct you for	
Board Chair Howell: So, stop illustrating it.	
Board Member Riddick:calling me a child. I-I'm call. So, now I'm demonstrating. So, where's your profession conduct?	nal
Board Member Dr. Brittingham: Can he be removed?	
Board Chair Howell: Uh, Dawn Marie, you have no place in this. If we're all going to act like children, this meeting is convened. Miss Slingluff, if you have further comments, please share them on Facebook (gavel strike) Good night. End of video feed.	
Board Member Riddick: I mean, I find it funny. End of recording.
